- The Statue of Liberty was given as a gift of friendship from France. It was given in 1866 and still stands on Liberty Island in New York.


South America

- The largest country in South America is Brazil and the capital of Brazil is Brasilia.
- There are 14 countries in South America.
- The Amazon Rainforest is home to over 10 million species of animals.
- Christ the Redeemer is a 38m statue placed on top of Mount Corcovado in Rio De Janeiro, Brazil. It took 5 years to build and was commissioned by the catholic church to remind Brazil that God loves them all.


Science – Food Chains & Webs

- Food chains always start with a producer (something that makes its own food) this is usually a plant.
- A food chain ends with a consumer (something that eats the plant or animal)
- The first consumer is called the primary consumer, then the secondary consumer and finally the tertiary consumer.

Below is an example of a food chain. The arrows show the direction that the energy is moving.

Vocabulary

Physical geography: Earth's physical features, such as mountains, deserts, rivers, and oceans.

Human geography different people, their communities, culture and economies and how they interact with the environment around them.

Equator: is an imaginary circle around Earth. It divides Earth into two equal parts: the Northern Hemisphere and the Southern Hemisphere. It runs east and west halfway between the North and South poles.

Tropic of Capricorn: marks the most southerly latitude at which the sun can appear directly overhead.

Tropic of Cancer: is the most northerly circle of latitude on Earth at which the Sun can be directly overhead.

State – an area organised by one government.

Continent – A continuous expanse of land.

Carnivore: is an animal that gets food from killing and eating other animals.

Omnivore: an animal or person that eats a variety of food of both plant and animal origin.

Herbivore: an animal that feeds on plants
